Are you willing to have a wildlife biologist complete a grassland bird assessment in your switchgrass field this summer?

 Seeking landowners who have established switchgrass fields to participate in bird assessments in June and July 2023.

What is the purpose?

- Research on the effectiveness of switchgrass as a habitat for grassland bird species.
- Long term goal to see if switchgrass farmers can be paid for establishing and maintaining grassland bird habitat, similar to 'delayed haying' payments, while operating fields as productive agricultural systems.



Grassland Birds and Switchgrass

Why are we focusing on grassland birds?

- Due to reductions in grassland habitat, grassland birds are in decline.
- Economic opportunities to those who offer habitat for grassland bird species.

Why Switchgrass?

- Switchgrass has been shown in other areas to be a habitat for these birds.
- Harvest activities for switchgrass that happen in fall, winter or spring don't disturb their breeding and nesting period (June-July)
- In future programing, switchgrass offers opportunities environmentally and economically.





What will participating landowners expect?

- A paid wildlife biologist would arrange with you to visit your farm to observe grassland birds and make field characterizations relating to grassland bird habitat.
 - Biologist will only record, and report observations related to grassland birds.
 - Arrangements can be made to suit the landowner's comfortability.
 - Encourage landowners to to join the biologist during their visit to learn more about grassland bird habitat and any species found on site
- The outcomes will be reported to OMAFRA and Environment and Climate Change Canada (ECCC)
 - Biologist will summarize all results using only regional location identifiers (e.g. township) when reporting to OMAFRA and ECCC. The results would not be linked to your specific farm.
 - The generalized results may be made public.



Requesting Participation

Landowners who choose to participate in this bird assessment project will be contributing to research that may be used to develop future funding programs for switchgrass farmers. Final reports will be shared among all participating landowners.
