

ADVANCED GRAZING MENTORSHIP PASTURE WALKS

From a tornado warning, to a trip on the Amherst Island ferry, and a whole lot of incredible information and camaraderie, this year's Advanced Grazing Mentorship Pasture Walks had something for everyone.

In partnership with Farmers for Climate Solutions and the Canadian Forage and Grassland Association, OFC hosted four pasture walks focusing on different aspects of rotational grazing. Topics included tips and tricks for fencing, different ways of moving animals between pastures, and discussions on water systems. Christine O'Reilly from OMAFA helped attendees think more critically about what is happening to their pasture plants and how long they need to recover.

The Grazing Mentors for these events included Mark Ritchie, Anita O'Brien, Dean Cober, Mike Swidersky, Joe Dickenson, Michaela Stoneman and the Chalmers family, and Birgit Martin.

FORAGE EXPO

Our Forage Expo events were a big success in 2024! These events gave over 500 attendees the chance to see the latest forage equipment, watch field demos, attend the trade show, and network with other producers.

The temperature was hot enough to make you melt on July 4th in Gorrie for the **Huron County Forage Expo**, but that didn't keep people away. Fifty pieces of equipment were registered for the event, ranging from mowers, rakes, and tedders, to mergers, balers, and harvesters. Equipment demos kept the field busy all day and then attendees were invited to check out the hay dryers across the road.

Eastern Valley Forage Expo in St. Isidore was thrown a curveball in the days leading up to the July 12th event when the rain from Hurricane Beryl passed through, leaving fields completely saturated. Showing the typical creativity and ingenuity of farmers, alternate plans were made for site setup and parking, while in-field demos were cancelled. Equipment reps kept the day going with engaging presentations and mowers eventually made it into the field for demos in front of eager attendees.

MAPLESEED PASTURE AWARD - SHEEP

WALKERTON FAMILY RECEIVES 2024 MAPLESEED SHEEP PASTURE AWARD



Steve and Lisa Ernewein and family of Meadowbook Family Farm in the Brockton/Walkerton area are the recipient of the 2024 Mapleseed Sheep Pasture Award. The award, sponsored by Mapleseed, the Ontario Forage Council, and Ontario Sheep Farmers, was presented today at the Ontario Sheep Farmers Annual General Meeting in Cambridge. For their exceptional pasture management while multi-faceted runnina а highly involved enterprise, Meadowbrook Family Farm received a cash award of \$250 and a bag of forage seed, courtesy of Mapleseed.

The Erneweins' Meadow Brook Family Farm operation includes approximately 1100 ewes in total. More than 800 ewes make up the meat flock which are Dorset/Rideau cross. They also milk more than 300 British Milksheep/Lacaune cross ewes for their milk production. On the grazing cycles the dairy herd is always grazing the highest quality portions of pasture out of the approximately 240 acres of grazing area. They are not organic certified but use "organic practices". The meat flock is on a year-round

accelerated lambing syllabus, lambing 100-150 per month. The dairy generated 50,000 liters of milk this year and the goal is to take that to 100,000 liters over the coming year. The Angus/Limo beef operation is utilized as part of the dual species parasite control in conjunction with clean and safe grazing practices.

MAPLESEED PASTURE AWARD - BEEF

JPD ANGUS WINS 2024 MAPLESEED BEEF PASTURE AWARD



The Beef Farmers of Ontario, Mapleseed and the Ontario Forage Council, sponsors of the Ontario Mapleseed Pasture Award, are pleased to announce that the Chalmers family of JPD Angus of Oro-Medonte in Simcoe County are the recipients of the 2024 Mapleseed Pasture Award. The award was presented today at the Beef Farmers of Ontario Annual General Meeting Banquet in Toronto. For their environmental improvements and exceptional pasture management, JPD Angus received a cash award of \$500 and a bag of forage seed, courtesy of Mapleseed.

At JPD Angus, the Chalmers family currently raise 60 cow-calf pairs, 20 yearling heifers and 20 yearling bulls on 120 acres of rotationally managed acres. They utilize rotational grazing as a method to both minimize damage to root systems on dry soil, and to maximize the number of cow-calf pairs per acre. While their well-drained soil has adequate moisture in the spring and fall, special attention is given to rest periods to preserve root structures and ensure pasture health and regrowth.

On the main farm, Lori and her husband Darryl manage the maternity pens, a handling barn, and 50 of the total pastured acres. Their sons Evan, Owen and Nolan all reside at home and serve in various roles on the farm – Evan manages the day-to-day operations, Owen is the lead mechanic and repair specialist, and Nolan helps with whatever needs to get done.

"We've been farming here since 2008. It's a true family effort', says Lori Chalmers.

Lori and Darryl's daughter Michaela and her husband Chris Stoneman manage the larger group of cattle at a nearby property, which consists of 70 acres of pastureland. Michaela and Chris also take the lead with promoting their herd genetics by showing cattle at local fall fairs and the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair.

FORAGE RESEARCH IN ONTARIO



This trial evaluates the impact of fertility management on the yield and quality of 19 different forage mixtures available on the Ontario market.

These treatments ranged from pure grasses to pure legumes and included common hay and pasture grass-legume mixes available on the market. The three fertility treatments to be tested include: 1) zero fertility control, 2) a one-time application/yr of 100 lbs/acre of 19-19 -19 (N-P-K) fertilizer, or 3) fertilize as needed according to OMAFRA guidelines based on soil testing. The 100 lbs/acre of 19-19-19 (NPK) was a light application of nutrients and less than the OMFRA recommended rates.

An economic analysis also provides information on profitable mixtures or species for producers in Ontario. The project spanned three years (field seasons were 2020, 2021, and 2022) and was conducted at the Ontario Crops Research Centre in Elora.

This project is in its final year of a 3-year trial that was based at the Ontario Crops Research Station in Elora. This project is evaluating different fall cover crop treatments planted after winter wheat harvest and followed by a corn crop.

The treatments include monocultures of oat, winter pea, berseem clover, balansa clover, red clover (frost seeded) and mixtures of oat/winter pea/radish, oat/berseem clover/radish, and oat/balansa clover/radish. The experiment compared the different cover crop monocultures and mixtures and the effect of harvesting a fall forage from the cover crop.

An economic analysis was conducted on potential N credit savings related to cover crop species and additional forage income to determine the best short-term economic practices.
